Nikolaus Schapfl

Composer

Nikolaus Schapfl, born in 1963 in Munich, Germany, started his musical education at the age of 7 and wrote his first compositions at the early age of 14. He studied composition from 1992 to 1996 at the University of Music and Performing Arts Vienna and at the University of Music and Dramatic Arts Mozarteum Salzburg and graduated with honors from the latter in



1996. His dissertation was entitled: "Introduction to the Tonal Language of Aleksandr Scriabin".

In 1995 his first CD, "Wandlung" (Lieder for soprano and piano) was realesed and in 1998 he recorded "Songs without Words" for violin and piano, together with Vladimir Tsypin, the principal violinist of the New York Philharmonic Orchestra.

His opera "The Little Prince", based on Saint-Exupéry's book, was premiered with great success in 2003 by the orchestra Junge Philharmonie Salzburg. Additional performances followed in several cities in Austria, Germany, France and Russia. In that same year he won the Eastman Prize in The Hof International Film Festival with his music for the movie "The Templar", written and directed by the Oscar winner Henckel von Donnersmarck (co-authors Florian and Sebastian Henckel v. D.). In 2008 Nikolaus Schapfl played in the famous Schloß Leopoldskron the solo part of his Concerto for Piano and Orchestra, accompanied by the Salzburg Philharmonic Orchestra. The Mozarteum Summer Academy of Salzburg showcased a Composer's Portrait of Nikolaus Schapfl in 2010. At the Grafenegg Festival 2012 he conducted the Tonkünstler Orchestra of Lower Austria, which performed the "Caravaggio - Elemente" - orchestral excerpts from his opera "Caravaggio", a work revolving around the life of the famous baroque painter. This opera, on which he is still currently working, was the subject to a documentary film produced in 2014 by the *University of* Applied Sciences of Salzburg. He's also currently working on an Oratorium commissioned by the City of Loitz, Germany. The premiere shall be performed in 2017 by the Permoník Youth Choir, the 1st-prize winner of the New York Choral Festival of 2013. His list of compositions varies greatly, including chamber music works as well. His **Quintet for Piano and Strings** was premiered by the ensemble mozARTE Quintett Salzburg in the Schloß Goldegg in August 2014. His most recent work, composed in January 2015, is "I Give You My Hand", a message of peace, hope and unity from the children of Salzburg to the world in the form of a musical video, starred by the soprano Johanna Mucha and the Salzburg Childrens' Choir.

His music has been played by many renowned orchestras and ensembles, including the *Münchner Rundfunkorchester* (Munich Radio Orchestra), the *Stuttgarter Philharmoniker*, the *Filharmonia Opolská* (Polish Philharmonic Orchestra), the *Shangai Symphonic Orchestra* and the *Badische Staatskapelle* of Karlsruhe.
